Annual Service Plan & Budget - Immunization

A. Community Need and Priorities

- There are 34 licensed child care centres and there are 10 private schools, 62 Elementary Schools, 15 High Schools, 10 Alternative High Schools in Leeds, Grenville and Lanark that must be assessed for compliance with the Immunization for Children in Schools and Licensed Child Care settings Protocol.
- There are 96 provider facilities that we distribute publicly funded vaccine to.
- There are 161 fridges that require annual inspections.
- Jurisdictional Wastage by vaccine is: 40%
- Wastage by Holding Point Type is: 13.4%
