Can my child hear?



Two out of 1,000 babies have permanent hearing loss at birth and two more develop hearing loss by the age of five, so it's important to watch for warning signs and get children's hearing checked even if they pass the newborn screening. Children with hearing loss may hear some sounds but miss others, making it harder to learn speech and language.







Early Identification of Hearing Loss

Wearing Hearing Aids or Cochlear Implants — 10+ hours/day

Best Possible Speech and Language

Talk to your doctor or Nurse Practitioner about hearing testing if your child:

- Turns the TV up or sits closer to the TV
- Asks to have instructions repeated or responds inappropriately to questions
- Is easily distracted or bothered by background noise
- Has difficulty telling sounds apart
- Has trouble paying attention
- Has speech and language, school and learning, or behavioural problems¹
- Complains of difficulty hearing or blocked ears
- Watches others to copy what they are doing
- People have to raise their voice to get your child's attention
- Shows inconsistent response to sound
- Watches the speaker's face closely to figure out what the person is saying
- Talks in a soft or loud voice²
- Has had repeated ear infections (2+)

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About Language Express

Language Express provides free speech and language assessment and therapy services for children from birth until the end of Junior Kindergarten in Lanark, Leeds, and Grenville counties. Don't wait and see! We can help your child and provide helpful ideas for you and your child's caregivers or teachers.

When To Get Help:

- If your child is not meeting all of the communication milestones for their age. Go to www.language-express.ca to complete the Language Express Communication Checkup.
- If your child is stuttering.
- If your child's play or social interaction seems different from other children the same age.
- If your child's voice doesn't sound right.
- If your child has a diagnosis such as hearing loss, Autism Spectrum Disorder, or developmental delay.

Language Express accepts referrals for children from birth until November 30 of the year they turn 4. For example, children born in 2018 must be referred by Nov. 30, 2022. Complete the Language Express Communication Checkup to see if your child's development is on track and to make a referral. You can also call us for more information or to make a referral.


